The loan of \$120,000 also includes money for the completion of a number of short extensions to the co-op's rural electric lines. The warehouse and office building is to be located on property in Red Springs purchased a year ago from D. M. McMillan. The site is on East Fourth Avenue (Lumberton Road) and Clay streets near the town limits.

The Corporation was organized in 1940 and to date has more than 1100 miles of line serving approximately 3600 members within Hoke, Scotland, Robeson and Cubmberland counties.

To date, the corporation has made all obligations on its loans and has made advance payments of some \$32,000 with \$10,000 invested in war bonds. It is now one of the larger REA cooperatives of the state and is operat-
