ed here today by Capt. George Forloines commanding officer of the Headquarters Battery of the 677th Antiaircraft battalion here.

Capt. Forloines explained that membership in a National Guard unit or a Class A Reserve unit for a specified length of time while in the age group subject to the draft under pending legislation, would give the young man the required training, and exempt him from going to a military camp. 

LUMBERTON - In the next ew months work will start on a administrative project, county the need of which was felt before the war which necessitated its postponement; the records of the Register of Deeds will be reindexed by the most modern system in existence so that a property title search will not only be simpler and quicker, but will be much more accurate. The "new system will do away with the necessity of searching book after book of transfers in tracing a deed and will reduce the possibility of overlooking a transfer in such a search to nearly zero. The work of indexing the more than 190.000 instruments dating back to 1787 in the Robeson County Register of Deeds will be done by the Cott Company of Cincinnati, Ohio, and will not be completed for two or three years The Cott system cross indexes all instruments by grantee, grantor, and property description. The present index in use was installed about 1906 and is antiquated and by reason of constant use over the years has becomé worn and in some cases illegible. Lawyers who use these records say that the work of abstracting in the Register of Deeds office has become well nigh impossible with the present outdated method of indexing.

The Cott system is the most modern in use and has been installed in Cumberland, Columbus and other nearby counties. An expert will be sent here to have charge of the work and a number of local persons will be em-




