Bad weather has, of course caused some delas as was expected when construction schedules were set up. At the present time 309 men, some of whom work in shifts around the clock, are at work on the vast

project.
Under contract with Thasco Ser vices, Inc., Blythe Brothers Construction Company, with 174 men on the job, are pressing work on the main building substructure and the discharge and intake tunnels. Other companies working at the immense 800 acres site include the Grinnell Company which has five men working on the power plant piping and installation; Koppers Company which has an additional seven men assisting the Grinnell crew and Ebasco which furnishes key men for various supervisor osition as well as a number of




