WO Laybourne Is
College Speaker

Warrant Officer Malcombe Laybourne, 92nd Airborne division, Fort Bragg, was guest speaker at the meeting of the student international relations club at Flora Macdonald college on Tuesday evening.

Officer Laybourne, who spoke with pride of his Scottish ancestry, held the deep attention of the club members, who have shown such intelligent interest in current world events during the past two college years as to become greatly in demand for programs at various civic clubs.

He explained present political world conditions with clarity, and outlined briefly the three political ideologies — capitalism, socialism, and communism, and explained the different phases of the North Atlantic Pact, which he said was the beginning of what the United States hoped would lead to a world wide movement for permanent peace. He stressed to the girls that the Pact does not in any way contradict the principles of the United Nations, but that the two organizations are working to the same end — complete world unity.
