NC Supreme Court Upholds Lower Court In School Case

County Officials Were Charged With Fund Misuse

The North Carolina Supreme Court yesterday upheld the dissolution of an injunction against the Robeson County Board of Education a.d other county bodies and officials, which was designed to prevent their spending county school funds and which charged misuse of funds. The injunction was dissolved by Judge Q. K. Nimocks last September. Appeal was taken and the Supreme Court heard the case presented two weeks ago.

The case entitled "Branch vs. Board of Educatio." was entered by a group of six Robeson citi-The injunction cited various misdeeds by county officials and also challenged the constitutionality of an act of the legislature under which the officials expended monies.
