### Presbyterian Junior College To Expand Courses In Aviation

Mechanics And Flight Training Will Be Offered

The opening of a flying school at the Laurinburg-Maxton airport was announced today by Presbyterian Junior college. Using facilities of the former base, the new school offers students one of the best flying fields in the south.

September plans call for the operation of a C.A.A. approved Master Mechanics course, providing ratings in both engine and fuselage maintenance, and flight courses leading to private pilot's license, commercial license, and flight instructor's rating.

The Laurinburg Flying Service will conduct the flight training, and ground instruction will be carried on by the college. The present flight instruction program is being carried to the new field. Since 1939, when the C.P.T. program began, Presbyterian Junior college has offered aviation instruction.

The use of the former Laurinburg-Maxton airport permits of the aeronautical program.
