Speak At College PEMBROKE.—Veterans Day in Pembroke tomorrow will come to a climax when Maj. Gen. S. LeRoy Irwin, Commanding Officer of Ft. Bragg, delivers an address at 8:00 c'clock in the college auditorium. The general will speak on "The Citizen and National Defence" and his talk will be the third and last

in the Citizenship Institute series. General Irwin is a West Pointer and received his commission as a cavalry officer in 1915. He was commissioned a brigalier in 1942 and a major general in 1943 while overseas. Commanding the 9th Infantry divisions artillery, the 55th division fo the Third Army and the XII corps during the war he saw combat duty against Rommel in Africa and in Normandy and in the Battle of the Bulge distinguished himself. His decorations include the Croix de Guerre with Palms and a Russian medal. Plans for the third annual Veterans Day start with a basketball game at the Pembroke State College gymnasium at 12:30 p.m. Both girls and boys college teams
