Barbecue Supper At Armory Celebrate's Group's First

Anniversary LUMBERTON-The Lumberton group of Alcoholics Anonymous sponsored barbecue supper on Tuesday night drew a crowd of more than 350 persons; the occasion was the celebration of the first anniversary of the group. Speakers from Washington, D. C., and Arlington, Va., explained the purposes and told of the accomplishments of the organization throughout the nation.

After the barbecue supper R. G. Cashwell, who, though not actually a member of the group, was one of those instrumental in founding the Lumberton group acted as master of ceremonies and described the organization and the record of the Lumberton group. He introduced Rev. A. E. Dillard for the invocation and for a short description of the Hebron Colony of Mercy at, Shulls Mill, near Boone. The colony takes only alcoholics and makes no charges, operating as a non-profit, non-sectarian insti-
