Some canning suggestions

Use of Corn Cutter. Gather resh tender corn, shuck, and lik and bring directly to cannery Ends of ears should be trimmed mooth. Oversized ears and unlersized ears should be cut by hand or discarded. If you wish and to you may eatch your cobs in a clean container and scrape by hand. The cutter will cut 20 ears per minute and do an excellent ub if operated properly

Use of pea and bean huller Lima or butter beans will be shelled in the morning only from

Peas will be shelled in the afernoon only from 12 to 3 o'clock Peas and beans should be gathered when free of dew or rain Do not wash before hulling. The huller will not do a good job if Rev. James R. Bremner of peas or beans are wet.
