Dr. Charles McBurney, the eminent surgeon, and R. H. Robertson of New York, come for a return visit.

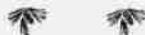
Mr. Douglas H. Thomas, Jr., and Edgar G. Miller, Jr., of Baltimore, were recent guests.

Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Mundy of Bradford, Pa., are here for the season.

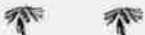

Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Brown of Manchester, N. H., are at The Pine Grove House for the winter.

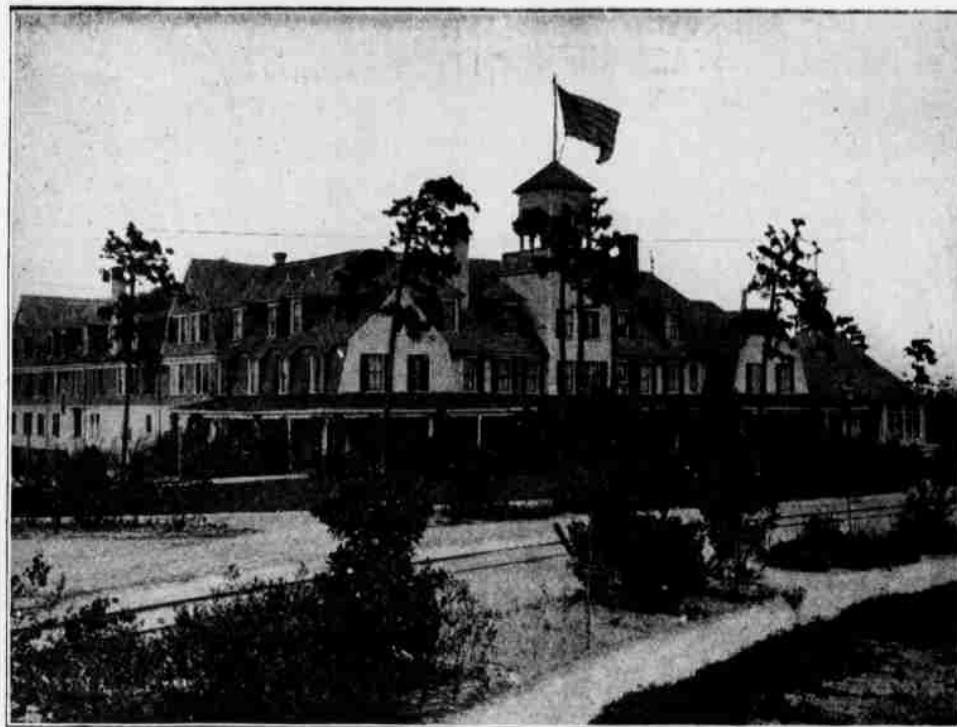
Mr. and Mrs. M. J. Nicholson of Baltimore, Md.; Miss N. M. White of New York, are among the recent arrivals.
