THE MEDAL PLAY HADICAP

Fifty Contestants Make Hard Fight for Handsome Trophies Offered.

Edwin A. Freeman Wins Gold Medal Offered for Best Gross Score—S. E. Armstrong and F. F. Robbins Tie.

FRIDAY'S eighteen-hole medal play handicap drew a field of fifty participants, and while the scores in general were a trifle high, the contest was a close one.

Edwin A. Freeman of the Montclair Golf Club, New Jersey, (scratch), won the gold medal offered for the best gross score with a pretty card of seventy-eight.

J. H. Yeager of the Kearsarge Golf Club, New Hampshire, playing with a handicap of ten, won the Pinehurst Cup offered for the best net score, with seventy-one.

S. E. Armstrong of Deal, N. J., (7), and F. F. Robbins of Ardsley, (18), tied for the silver medal offered for the second best net score, at seventy-five.

As to iron, if there is any in Pinehurst Water, it cannot be detected in the amount submitted.
