## EIGHTY-TWO HAND IN CARDS

Midwinter Tournament Largest in History  
of Southern Golf.

C. B. Fownes of Highland Golf Club,  
Pittsburg, Close After Travis who  
Wins Gold Medal—Scores Close.



EIGHTY-TWO participants  
handed in cards for the  
qualifying round in the  
Second Annual Midwinter  
Tournament; the largest  
and most important field  
in the history of Southern golf.

Walter J. Travis, the British open  
champion, won the gold medal for the  
best score, but the victory was no walk-  
over and the margin was a very small  
one; C. B. Fownes, of the Highland Golf  
Club, Pittsburg, finishing second with 83.  
W. C. Fownes, Jr., the Atlantic City  
champion, generally regarded as 'Travis'  
most dangerous rival, finished third in 84.
