

FOR THE CAROLINA CUPS

Match Play Handicap Mixed Foursomes Develop Many Close Contests.

L. D. Pierce and Mrs. G. H. Converse Defeat C. L. Becker and Miss Check in Final Round.

**T**HE match play handicap mixed foursomes for The Carolina cups developed one of the seasons closest and most interesting tournaments, two twenty-seven hole and one twenty-one hole match being played.

L. D. Pierce and Mrs. G. H. Converse, both of Boston, playing with a handicap of twelve, were the winners of the final round, defeating C. L. Becker, Boston, and Miss Check, East Orange, N. J., whose handicap was eight, two up and one to play.

In the first round G. Lee Knight, Philadelphia, and Miss Mix, New York, (6), lost by one down on twenty-seven holes to Mr. Becker and Miss Check, and Allan Lard, Washington, and Miss Mary Dutton, Boston, (2), won by two and one, on twenty-seven holes from G. H. Converse, Boston, and Mrs. William West, Camden, N. J., (18).

Mr. Becker and Miss Check won a twenty-one hole match in the semi-finals from F. A. King, Northboro, Mass., and Mrs. M. D. Paterson, New York, (8), by two up.

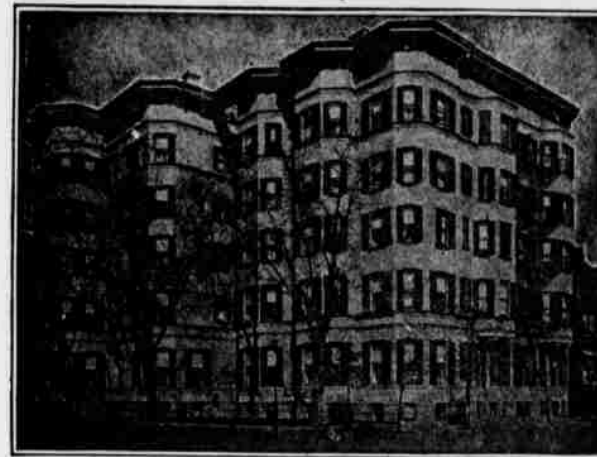
