

BECKER WINS HANDICAP

Leads the Field Low With Gross Card of Seventy-eight.

W. C. Freeman, W. B. Rhett and T. W. Weeks Tie for Net Score at Seventy-nine.



THE eighteen-hole medal play handicap played in connection with Friday's morning round drew a field of over seventy participants, and resulted in the closest event of its character ever seen here, fourteen of the participants finishing in eighty-two and under, with numerous ties throughout the entire list.

C. L. Becker of the Woodland Golf Club, Auburndale, won the gold medal offered for the best gross score, with a card of seventy-eight, two duplicate rounds of thirty-nine, leading the entire handicap field by a stroke, and his nearest gross score opponents Fred Herreshoff, of New York, and Edwin A. Freeman, of Montclair, three strokes. E. S. Armstrong, of the Deal Golf Club, scored eighty-two gross.

William C. Freeman, of Montclair, William B. Rhett, of the Crescent Athletic Club, Brooklyn, and T. W. Weeks, of the Storm King Golf Club, New York, tied for the best net score, at seventy-nine each.
