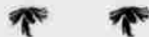

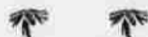

#### At Jackson Springs.

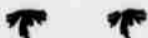

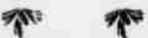


#### Palm Beach Out of Doors.

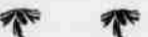
Dances, card parties, dinners and other formal and semi-formal events are coming into prominence as the season advances.
