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## JONES OUTSTRIPS FIELD

Nine Strokes to Good in Seventy-Two Hole Professional Contest.

Low Second, Herd Third and Ross and Smith Tie for Fourth--Braid Makes Record Sixty-Eight.

**S**ELDOM, if ever, has a professional golf contest here, either in interest or importance, equalled the seventy-two medal play contest, between the famous British and leading American professionals, which ended Tuesday. From start to finish interest was at high pitch, and the downpour of rain and consequently high scores of Monday, only served to make the perfect weather and spectacular play of Tuesday, stand out all the more brilliantly. Hundreds followed the progress of play from beginning to end, waiting eagerly for news at the Country Club house or hotels, Monday, and flocking to the course Tuesday. Of disappointment in the result there was much, for the hearts of the gallery were naturally, with the American professionals and the local men in particular, but this, if anything, served only to key interest to the highest pitch.

Roland Jones, of the Wimbledon Golf Club, England, took the honors, gaining a lead on the opening day, which he kept to the end, finishing with a grand total of 309, nine strokes in the lead of George Low, of Baltusrol, who made 318. Alex Herd, of the Huddersfield Golf Club, England, was third, a stroke away, in 319, and Donald J. Ross, of the local club, and Alex Smith, of Nassau, were tied at fourth at 321, and divided. The prizes were \$200, \$150, \$100 and \$50.

The spectacular feature of the contest and a fitting incident of the brilliant play of the closing day, was a phenomenal and record breaking round of sixty-eight, made by William Braid, of Hampton Terrace. This card reduces the previous record of the course held by Donald Ross, three strokes, and clips off one from Travis' famous sixty-nine, made when the course was generally conceded to be at least three strokes easier than at present.

## J. D. FOOT THE WINNER

Defeats G. Lee Knight Seven and Six in St. Valentine's Finals.

Perfect Weather, Unusually Large Field and Much Enthusiasm Features of Event.

**P**ERFECT weather, an unusually large field of entries, good golf, and much enthusiasm, were the distinctive features of the second annual St. Valentine's tournament which ended with semi-final and final rounds, Friday.

As a general rule the winners had a comparatively easy time of it in the final round, but the cups were won only after hard fought battles, the close matches coming earlier in the game.

J. D. Foot, the Apawamis war-horse, was the winner of the President's or first division trophy, defeating G. Lee Knight, of the Philadelphia Country Club, 7 up and 6 to play, and with a medal play round of eighty-two.

T. E. Jacobs, of the Wollaston Club, took the third division from W. R. McShea, of Atlantic City, 5 and 4, and C. A. Gaiser, of Hackensack, the consolation.

C. H. Sawyer, of Cambridge, secured the fourth division from J. H. Redfield, of Brooklyn, 6 and 4, and H. H. Harper, of Wollaston, the consolation.

There were cups for the winners and runners-up in each of the principal divisions, and for the winners of the consolations.

The big week of golf ends today with an eighteen hole medal play handicap, in which a large number of trophies are offered, and a big field of contestants is assured.
