STEEPLECHASE or continuous golf, was a novel feature of the week. The idea was to tee up only on the first tee, playing round the flag on each hole, doing no putting except upon the home green. Prizes were offered for the three best net scores, T. E. Jacobs, of Wollaston, whose handicap was 5, winning first with fifty, Frank M. Zittel, of New York, (15), second with fifty-six, and D. E. Little, Wollaston, (5), third with fifty-seven. Mr. Jacobs also made the best gross score of the afternoon, fifty-five, which is considered remarkably good going under the circumstances.
