MISS MARY DUTTON IS FIRST

Makes Ninety-two in Qualification for Women's Tournament.

Mrs. G. Lee Knight Takes Net Score Trophy--Match Play Rounds Still in Progress.

THE final rounds of the women's match play handicap tournament are still in progress, bringing to a close the most successful event of its character ever held here. Keen play has been the rule throughout, and the final result is being awaited with much interest.

In qualification Monday, Miss Mary C. Dutton of the Oakley Country Club, Watertown, led the field with a card of ninety-two, going out in forty-eight and coming back in forty-four. Miss Gertrude Gilbert of Philadelphia, was a close second in ninety-four, Miss Almira McNeely of Philadelphia, third in ninety-eight, and Mrs. M. D. Paterson of Englewood, and Miss Ethel S. Check of East Orange, tied for fourth at ninety-nine each.

Mrs. G. Lee Knight of Philadelphia, whose handicap was thirty, took the net score cup with eighty-eight, with Mrs. Montgomery A. Crockett of Buffalo, whose handicap was also thirty, second in ninety.

Qualification Round of Spring Tourney a Pretty Contest.

Eighty-one Starters and Seventy-nine Cards--Match Play Rounds Develop Keen Golf.

A FIELD of eighty-one participants started in the qualification round of the second annual Spring tournament, Wednesday, seventy-nine handing in cards. The features of the days play was the pretty contest for the golf medal offered, L. D. Pierce of the Woodland Golf Club, Auburndale, Mass., leading the field with a margin of three strokes.

C. L. Becker of the same club, was second with eighty, Charles B. Fownes, Jr. of Oakmont, third in eighty-one, Allan Lard of Columbia, fourth in eighty-two, and J. D. Foot of Apawamis, and L. E. Wardwell of Megunticook, tied for fifth at eighty-three each.
