## ENDS IN BLAZE OF GLORY

Brilliance of Championship Finals Dims Records of the Past.

Wood Defeats Becker in Fastest Match Ever Played Here—The Story of the Week.

THE sixth annual United North and South amateur championship tournament ended Thursday in a blaze of glory which dims all past records by its brilliancy, the thirty-six hole final

ning the score on the twenty-ninth. Mr. Becker, however, regained the lead on the next hole, but only for a brief period, for Mr. Wood took the thirty-first and thirty-second, maintaining the lead gained by halving the next three holes, and winning the thirty-six and the match.

As a brilliant rally and up-hill fight the match stands well up in national golfing annals, and it is a striking example of the value of thirty-six hole finals in important contests. The medal play scores of the players, for the thirty-six holes, were both in Bogey, one hundred and fifty-eight, and Mr. Wood's afternoon round, seventy-four, is one of the prettiest tournament cards ever made here. A peculiar feature lies in the fact that both morning rounds were made in forty-two and both afternoon rounds in thirty-seven.

### BROKAW'S DEFEAT.

The surprise of the tournament and one of its brilliant matches, was Mr. Becker's defeat of George T. Brokaw, the Garden City crack, who won the qualification gold medal at a record clip.

Mr. Brokaw was a bit off his best game to be sure, and Mr. Becker was by no means in his best form, but the scores were close enough to Bogey to make the Colonel uncomfortable; fast enough golf to win plenty of cups anywhere.

The like of the contest will not be seen either in this country or abroad for many a day, and the big gallery which followed the afternoon round will have a story to tell which all will be glad to hear.
