The next two holes were halved, Ross winning the long thirty-second in four, Nichols winning the thirty-third and again evening the score. A four gave Ross the thirty-fourth and the lead, the last two holes being halved, a topped drive undoubtedly losing Nichols an opportunity to tie the score on the thirtysixth green.
