QUALIFICATION SCORES



THE special feature of the qualification round of the Advertising Men's tournament was a handicap played in connection with three prizes each for the best net and the best gross scores, an arrangement which kept the handicap committee busy, but which met with much favor among contestants.

G. B. Adams of New York, led the field with the best gross score and a card of 82, W. E. Shackelford of Atlantic City, landing second in 83, and L. A. Hamilton of New York, and Edwin A. Freeman of Brooklyn, tying for third in 84, Mr. Hamilton winning the prize in the play-off.

W. M. Sanford of New York, was easily the winner of the net score trophy, playing with a handicap of 16 and scoring 71 net, Mr. Adams (3) finishing second in 77, and G. C. Pierce of Chicago, (18) third in 78, the balance of the field in both gross and net scores bunching in many ties.

Qualification was in gross score order, 93 marking the limit of the first division, 98 the second, 104 the third, and 113 the fourth, as evenly matched a field as has ever been gathered here in this event; five divisions of sixteen each and one of eight, qualifying.
