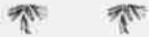

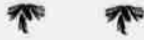

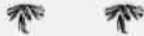
At The Cedars and Lenox.

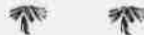

MISS SINCLAIR—MISS WINANTS.

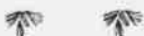
They are Trophy Winners in Subscription Rifle Shoot.
