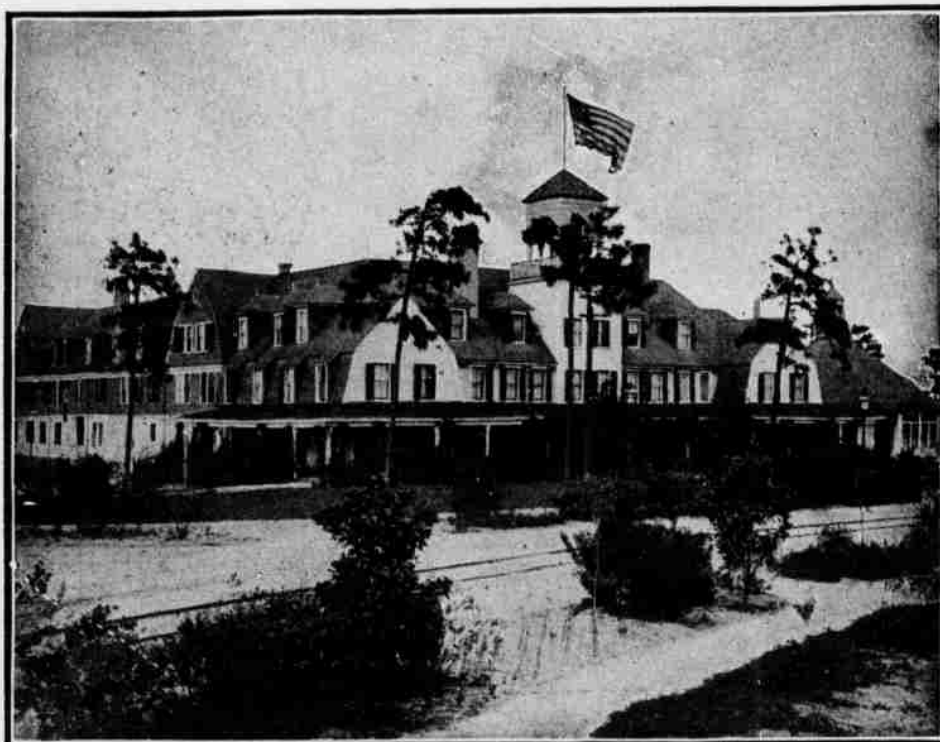


# THE HOLLY INN
