# BECKER IS CLUB CHAMPION

CLUB president C. L. Becker playing under Woodland Golf Club colors, carried off Club Championship honors in the annual tournament of the Tin Whistles, his opponent in the final rounds being John E. Porter of the Allegheny Country Club. From first to last it was a pretty give and take contest, with the medal play scores pushing Colonel Bogey hard; a halved hole on the home green deciding it.

Going out, Mr. Porter took the third and seventh holes and Mr. Becker the fourth, fifth and eighth, starting home one up. The Pittsburger squared matters on the eleventh, but the Woodland man took the twelfth and thirteenth, losing the fourteenth, halving the fifteenth, being two up again on the sixteenth, Mr. Porter making a brilliant try for a tie with a lucky two on the seventeenth, but failing to do better than a halve on the home green.

The medal scores were eighty for Mr. Becker, and seventy-nine for Mr. Porter; the former's putting being the feature of the round.
