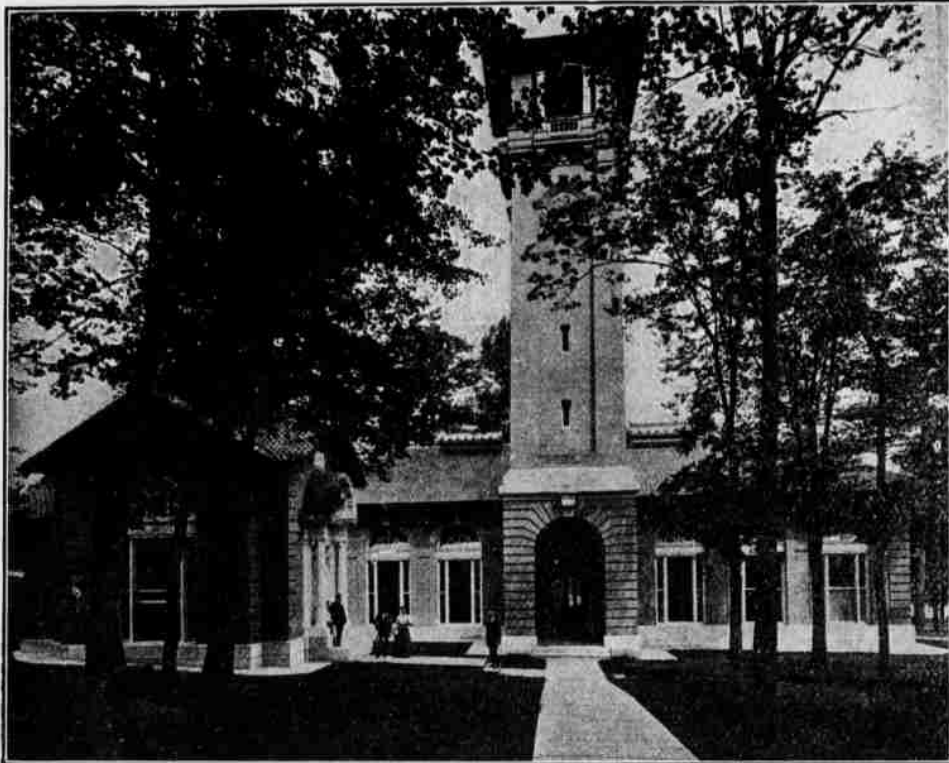

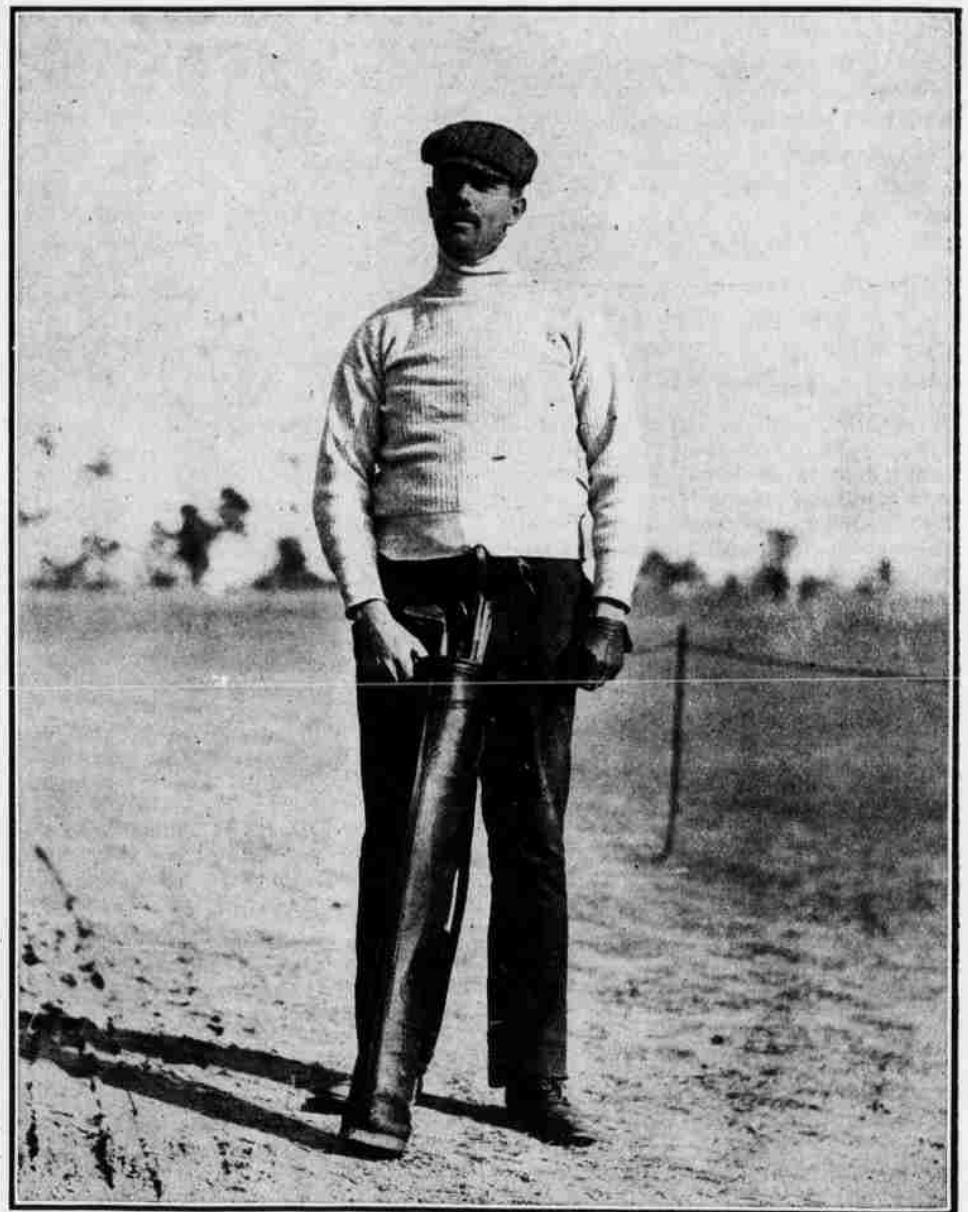
Becker and Sproule are Second Four-
