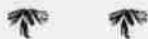


he wrote his first book, "The Spenders"; suggested by the contrast of his boyhood life in the West, with New York "when the lights are on."

Mr. Wilson has lived much in Paris and Italy with Mr. Tarkington, a life of which he is very fond and in which he has found many motifs.



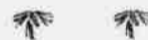
#### DR. HARDY WINS PISTOL CUP.

Interest aroused has led to plans for a series of handicap events.

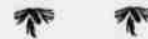


#### GUESTS OF MISS ESTHER.

#### Hunt Breakfasts in the Field.

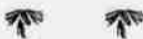

#### Euchre at The Magnolia.

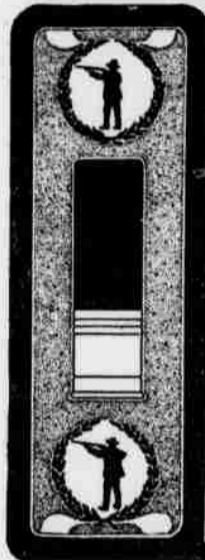

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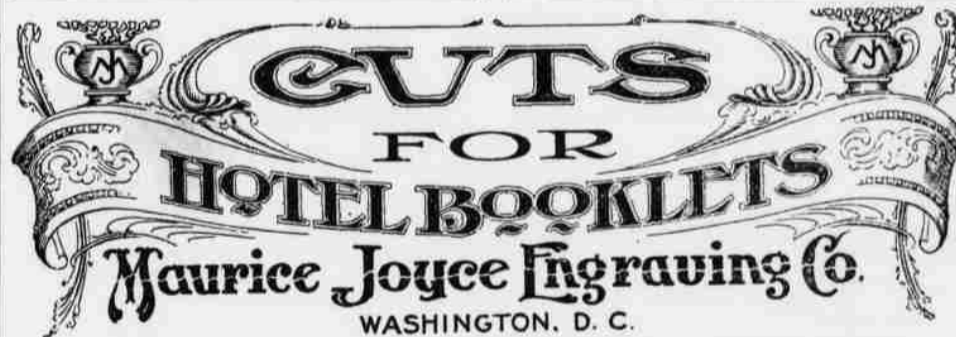
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
