"It's lika this, yer see: 'Eef you-ns convart me *who in heall is goin' ter drive them mules?*'"

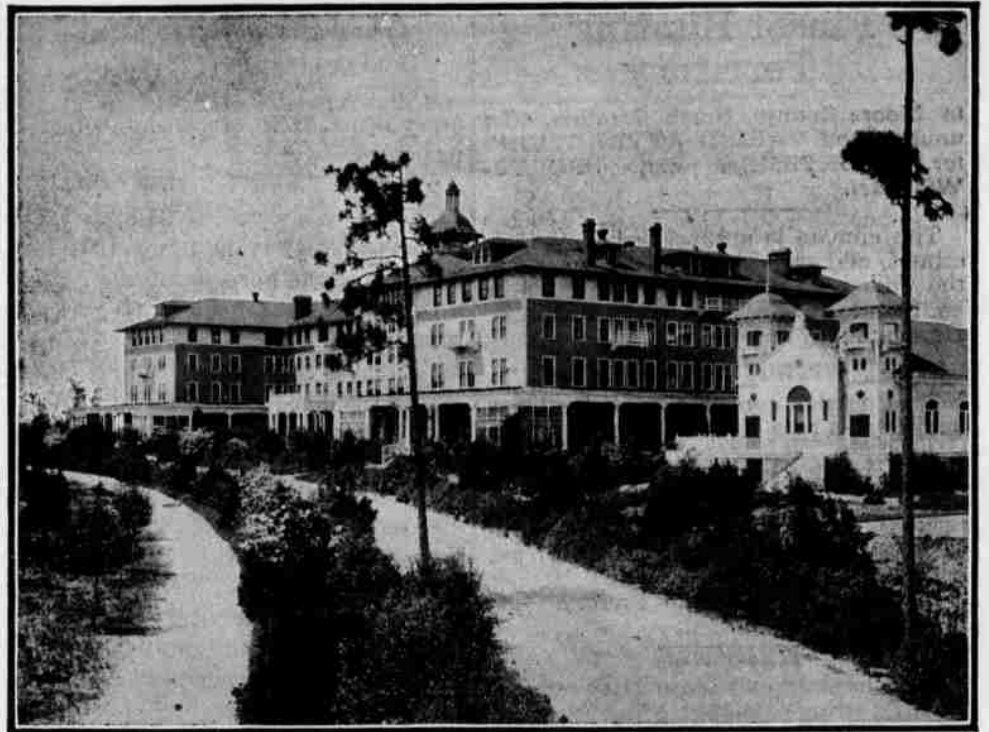
In Time of Need.

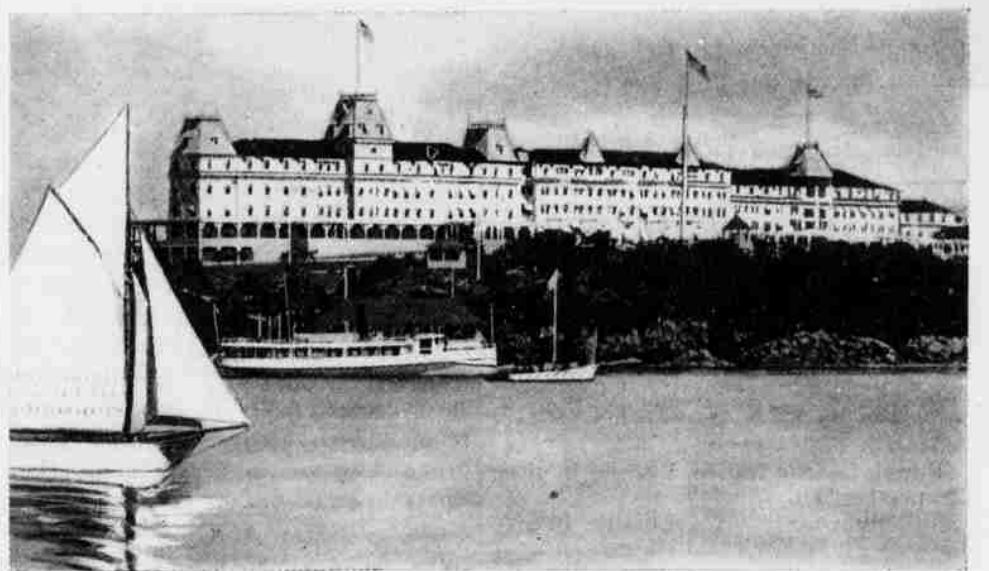
