Conditions continue excellent and many will enjoy the sport during the weeks to come.




## 'Twas Sad, but Everybody Laughed.

"I saw a rather sad sight the other day," remarked a hunter at The Inn, "a negro's grave with just a single stick to mark it."



## Bullets by the Pound!


