**EIGHTH ANNUAL SPRING TOURNAMENT**—March 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, (Pinehurst System)—Gold medal for best qualification score, President's, Governors', Secretary's, Treasurer's, Captain's, and Club cups to division winners, sterling cups to first division runner-up and consolation winner, silver medals to other division runners-up and consolation winners, sterling cups to division winners in special overflow consolation in divisions of eight.

**TENTH ANNUAL UNITED NORTH AND SOUTH AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP (Women)**—March 25, 26, 27, 28, 29,—Gold medal for best qualification score, Championship cup to the winner and sterling cups to runner-up and consolation winner.
