New England Logging

Ten million dollars will be required to pay the army of lumbermen at work in the forests of northeast Maine, New Hampshire and Vermont and the provinces of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia this winter. In this army of loggers are 60,000 men and 22,000 horses. The fruits of the campaign will be a crop of 2,500,000,000 feet of pine, cedar, spruce, hemlock and birch. In Maine the harvest for the pulp mills will reach the enormous total of 350,000,000 feet this winter. The amount cut for the sawmills will not be far from 400,000,000.
