PLAYED ON THREE COURSES

Fifty-Four Different Holes in Tin Whistle Championship Tourney

W. C. Fownes, Jr., H. C. Fownes, N. S. Hurd and W. H. Thayer Win Principal Gross and Net Prizes



UNDOUBTEDLY the most unique contest in the history of golf was the Tin Whistle Championship which occupied the week, its special feature eighteen holes on three distinct courses, possible only with Pinehurst's unequalled equipment. Heading the field with a total of two hundred and thirty-one, was W. C. Fownes, Jr., with rounds of seventy-five, seventy-five and eighty-one; Henry C. Fownes second in two hundred and forty-two, his cards seventy-five, eighty-four and eighty-three. N. S. Hurd whose handicap was twenty-seven, won the net score with two hundred and eighteen; W. H. Thayer whose allowance was twenty four, second in two hundred and twenty-three. The best gross for eighteen holes exclusive of the scores made by the Fownes', was seventy-six for Col. J. E. Smith and the best net seventy-two for H. W. Ormsbee whose handicap was sixteen. Net scores in full follow:
