ANNUAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

Tin Whistles Play Fifty-Four Different Holes on Three Distinct Courses

Silver Foils are Content with Thirty-Six Holes on Two Courses—Prize Winners Number Nine in All



FIFTY-FOUR holes of medal play on as many different holes and three distinct courses was the unique feature of the annual Tin Whistle Championship. ¶ Parker W. Whittemore of the Brookline Country Club was an easy winner of the championship trophy with a grand total of two hundred and twenty-six; Henry C. Fownes of Oakmont who scored two hundred and forty-two, finishing second eight strokes in the lead of C. L. Becker of Woodland. ¶ Dr. J. S. Brown of Montclair, whose allowance was twenty on each round, won the net trophy with two hundred and eighteen. J. M. Thompson of Springhaven who deducted eighteen strokes in all, won second in two hundred and twenty-five. ¶ Robert Hunter of Wee Burn who scored seventy-six on the number three course, won the trophy offered for the best eighteen-hole round, and a seventy-two on number two course for C. M. Jamison of Greensburg who deducted twelve strokes, captured the prize offered for the net score. ¶ The scores of the thirty-two players who turned in cards for all three courses showed an average of ninety-three on number one, ninety-six on number two and ninety-eight and a half on number three, thus making number two course three strokes harder than number one, and number three two and a half strokes harder than number two, and five and a half strokes harder than number one. ¶ The scores:
