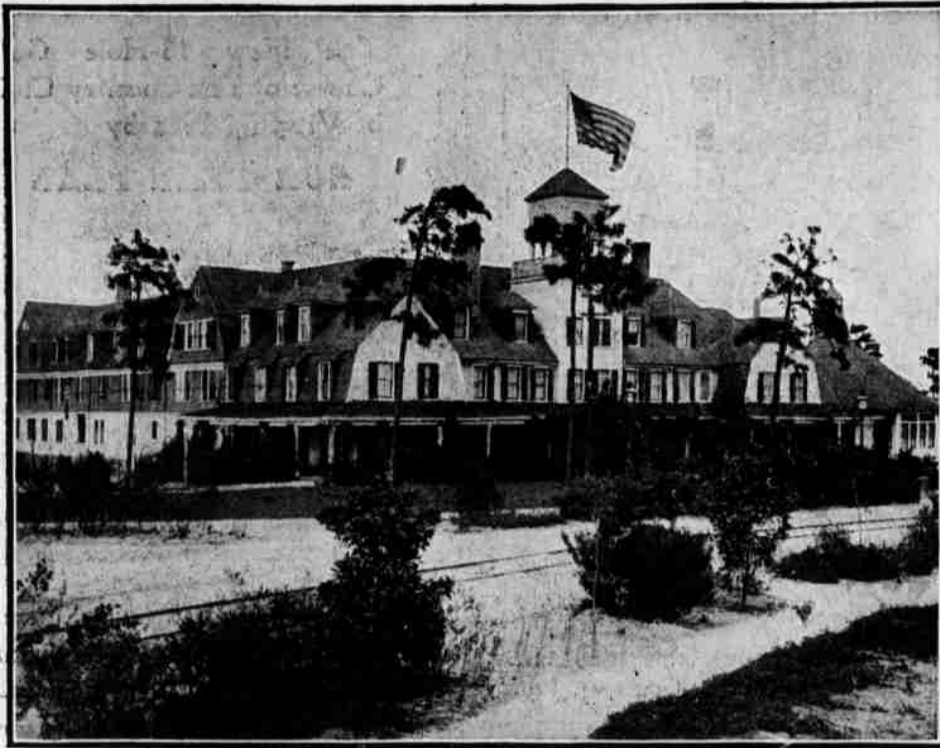


THE HOLLY INN
