Regarding Ouimet's visit here *The Boston Traveler* of January 15th says: "The Woodland Golf Club celebrity seriously intended at the close of the 1913 golf season, which ended in the complete triumph of Massachusetts in the Lesley cup play at The Country Club, to put his clubs away until spring. Ever since he won the open title at Brookline, Ouimet has been importuned to appear in exhibitions and in special matches on southern courses this winter, but has steadily refused. His trip next week will be the result, pure and simple, of his keen desire to again drive the ball off the tee, to again gamble against a thousand insidious and treacherous difficulties on the putting-green. He will not allow himself to be inveigled into going farther south than Pinehurst."

Continuing reference is made to the much-talked-about match between Ouimet and Chick Evans. "In speaking of the match says *The Traveler*, Evans is quoted as having said: 'If the match is arranged it will probably be played on the Oak Bluffs or on some eastern course. Needless to say I would enjoy such a match, not only for the fine test of skill which it would bring, but I feel that I should be able to learn much of Ouimet's style of play in an actual match which I could not learn from merely watching him on the links.'

"The Brookline player does not like to talk much about what he intends to do next summer after his return from Europe, but his friends know that he would be the last golfer of them all to refuse such a good sporting proposition as a match against a golfer of Evan's international reputation. ¶ Ouimet did not sidestep the opportunity to play Jerry Travers, one of the game's greatest match players, at a time when Ouimet would have had the best of excuses for sidestepping in the fact that he had just passed through the exhausting open championship play. Here is the way he spoke this morning of a possible match with Evans: 'Why, of course I would be glad to play Evans. Where? Oh, anywhere.'"

In this connection it is interesting to note that it is barely possible that this match may take place during Ouimet's visit here, for Evans may be in Atlanta during the time, in which case the many friends of both golfers gathered here will make a strenuous effort to bring the pair together. Among those actively interested are Robert Hunter of Noroton and Walter G. Clark of Woodland.
