tion of this tribe is in Oklahoma, and the lands are held in common, everything being under Government supervision. ¶ On the other hand it is the State which maintains the public schools, including the training school, for the so-called Croatans. The latter are considerably mixed by intermarriages with whites and in some cases with negroes, but intermarriage is now forbidden. There has been unlawful living in the past among them and whites and blacks, and the beauty of some of the Croatan women has made them the wives of men in states

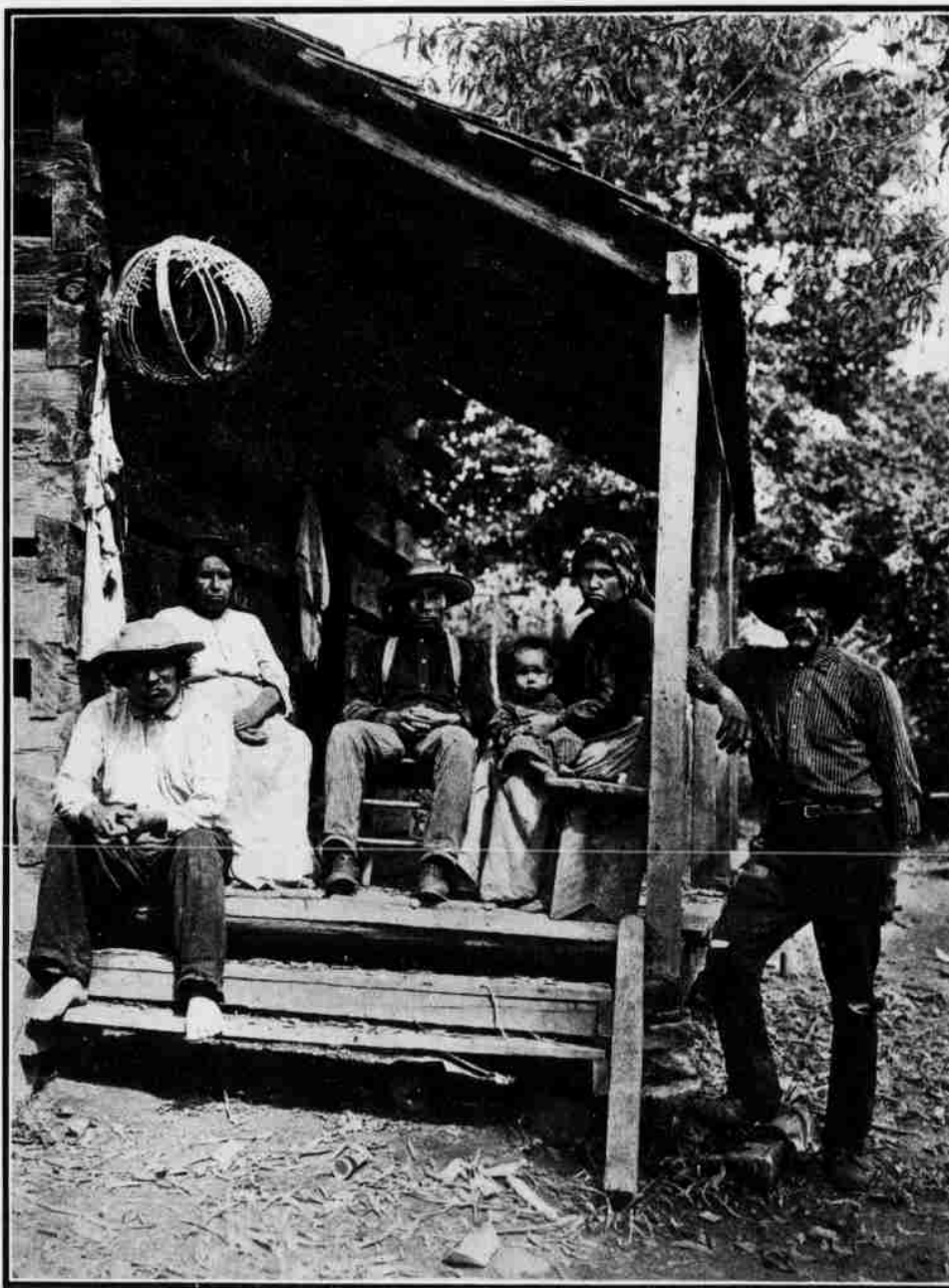
DR. GREGG WINS SHOOTING

further south. The Croatans hold their lands individually, like the whites. They have scattered considerably in the Cape are known officially as the "Eastern Band Fear section. It does not seem at all probable that they will ever gain recognition from the United States as regular Indians. They have no chief or sub-chief but some spokesmen or leaders and one of these paid a visit to President Roosevelt at the White House and made an address in which he spoke of his people as the descendants of Sir Walter Raleigh's "Lost Colony of Roanoke" and the Indians of the coast. The best authorities here now do not believe in this. The people of that colony were either killed or else amalgamated with the Hatteras Indians, the only ones who were steadily friendly towards them.—FRED A. OLDS.
