ROBESON AND HUNTER

A missed putt cost Hunter the tenth in 5, both players off the course on their tee shots and on the eleventh, and both missing seconds; Robeson's fine third resulting in a 5-6 win. Robeson was in the rough again on the twelfth and his second was short, but the third was a beauty which made a 4 possible, while Hunter was short on his third and required a stroke for a position on the green side by side with the Pawling student. Robeson's drive on the thirteenth cost him the hole, a curious slice far over to the right of the fourteenth fairway. His second was still off the course, at the right, his third over, his fourth short and he recorded 6, while Hunter made a fine recovery from a trapped second and went down in 5. Hunter's fourteenth tee shot was in the rough with Robeson straight down the course and with good distance. Hunter's second was short and likewise his third, but Robeson was off the course to the right on his second and did well to halve in 5. An over approach cost Robeson the fifteenth where Hunter recorded a winning 3, and the sixteenth wa halved in 5, both players trapped on the drives, and Robeson failing to take a vantage of his fine recovery. ¶ On th critical seventeenth both balls were hold high, and just off the green; Robeson a the right and Hunter at the left. Hun er's short second gave Robeson an adva tage which he failed to embrace, an Hunter hit the cup on his third, Robesc taking two putts for a halve and a tw and one win. ¶ The cards:
