That Mr. Harris is also fully capable of properly handling music of a more dramatic type was convincingly shown in his arias from La Boheme and L'Africaine.

Mme. Lyska's dramatic voice, with its fine low tones, gave us a real treat in her Dvorak Czech Song, Gipsy Song by Brahms, Quilter's 'Come Back' and the Habanera from Carmen, all of which were enthusiastically applauded.

Besekirsky's rendering of Sarasate's Zigeunerweisen was delightful. In this, and in the Cavatina, with its fine clear tones; in Arensky's Senerade which was played with both delicacy and verve; and in Rachmaninoff's Danee, which brought out his remarkable technique, he gave us of his best.
