MANY DEAD SHOTS

There were a number of excellent strings recorded in the tournament. J. R. Jahn of Davenport broke 146 without a miss, a record all but equally matched by his rival W. H. Jones, the Georgia expert, with 145 in succession to his credit. Dr. D. L. Culver of Jersey City had a straight score of 131, and another of 117 to his credit, and George S. McCarthy of Philadelphia chalked up a run of 117, which is fairly good shooting for a man who has been doing no tournament work for three years past. Billy Yule, winner of the President's trophy in the main event, made 130 at one time and 100 consecutive breaks were awarded to D. L. Holland from Springfield, C. H. Newcomb broke 105 without a miss the last two days, and many others made scores closely approaching the hundred mark.

P. W. Whittemore of Brookline, entered from Pinehurst, made a record for the 600 targets of 558; for the 800, 731, 28 behind the winners. Shooting at 19 yards he made 85 in the Preliminary Handicap, 88 in the Midwinter; his record was 93 in the 16 yard 100 target event on Saturday, and 88 in the consolation.

A special consolation handicap of 100 targets was pulled off on the last day of the meet. There were 77 entries, and a ruling that those who had finished in the money in either of the other handicap

events should be burdened with an extra yard. E. W. Anderson of Reecatonia, Ill., standing at the 18 yard mark, carried away this prize with 98 dead ones.

60 guns also competed in a 16 yard 100 target performance Saturday morning, won by C. B. Platt of Bridgeton, N. J., with the remarkable score of 99, 98 of which were without a break.
