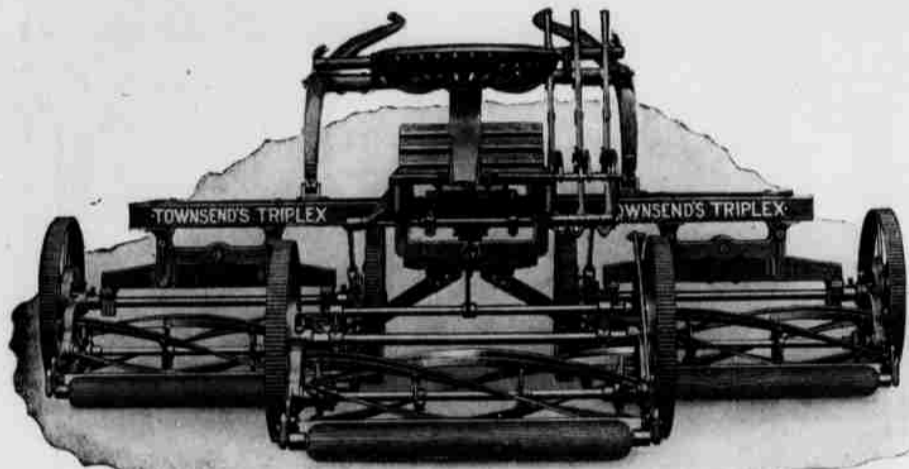

Robert Hunter, the Wee Burn player who has so often figured in the finals on the Pinehurst links, was back on his game and claimed an eighty-three.
