stantial margin of 6, her 95 being the only card under 100. Mahan of St. Davids landed fourth with 106, one better than Miss Carolyn Bogart of Pinehurst, Mrs. Landauer of Woodmont and Mrs. Spencer Waters of Ardsley.

Mrs. Waters put up a strong game against the winner in the first round only losing on the 18th green. Miss Gertrude Thurston came into the semi-finals after a smashing victory over Miss Bogart, and went down before the champion, 4 and 3. Mrs. Hurd came through to the finals in expected form after interesting matches with Mrs. Landauer (4 and 2) and Mrs. J. D. Chapman (6 and 5).

Mrs. F. S. Danforth of North Fork established her unquestioned superiority in the second division, and won the Governors' trophy in good style by defeating Mrs. Edward Worth of Springhaven 8 and 7, Miss Eleanor Abbe of Bethlehem 4 and 2, Mrs. J. D. Armstrong of Buffalo 7 and 5.

It was one of those even and vacillating matches which bring all hands breathless to the 18th green, and reduce the whole afternoon's play into a single heartrending putting match. In this Mrs. Hempstead had a slight advantage gained down the fairway with her mid-iron, which she converted into the trophy.
