The First Dance of the Season Well Attended. Echoes From Many Scenes of Battle Heard

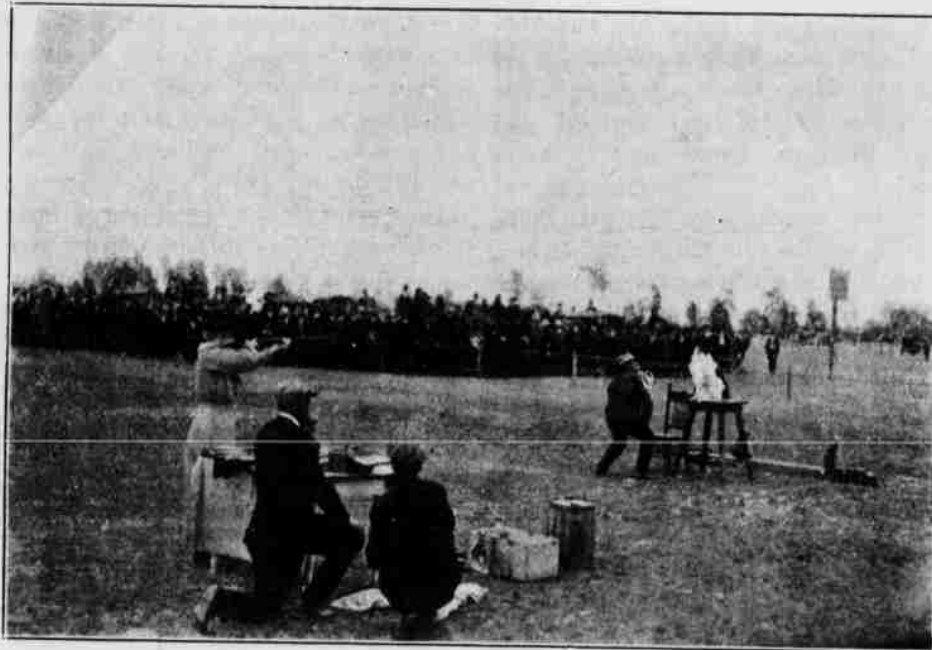
