Outshoots Dr. Vanderhoof for the Midwinter Trophy

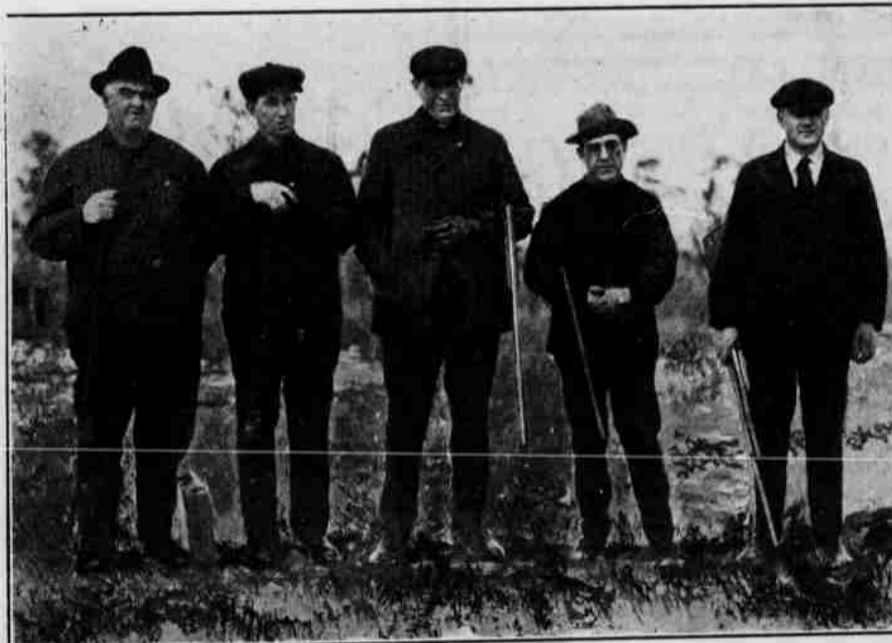
Richards and Kelsey Close Competitors in Famous Handicap Twenty-one Cleared 90 Mark

Shooting from the nineteen yard mark A. G. Healy of Windsor, Ontario broke 95 of the one hundred targets thrown in the Midwinter Handicap shot at the Pinehurst Gun Club last Friday. There were 110 guns in this banner shooting contest, the climax of the week's competitions. Healey had to work for his trophy. Between him and the ninety mark there were twenty-one guns. And when the hundred targets had flown he was tied with Dr. W. W. Vanderhoof of Watkins, New York. He led the doctor by one shot all the way through the engagement until they reached the last frame. Here the champion twice shot over his mark, while Vanderhoof broke nineteen and evened up the score. Healy walked

off with the trophy in the shoot off 18 to 15. Pushing these two at the finish, and actually ahead of them the whole trip until the last twenty targets were thrown were C. L. Richards and F. D. Kelsey. This pair fell down badly on the last frame, missing three birds apiece, and so losing their chance at the shoot off by one point. Richards was shooting from 21 yards, and Kelsey from 17. Two 17 yard men came in under the guns with a card of 93, George Gray of Philadelphia and Harold Atkinson of Oxford.

There were six special trophies for division winners in this Midwinter Shoot, beside the Mede for the winner. Richards' 94 was good for the award in the first division. Vanderhoof himself held high gun in the second; M. M. McVey, Jr., cracking 91 took off the third division, F. Billmeyer landed the fourth. Harold Amert's 90 was good for the fifth, and George Gray snapped up the sixth with a 93.
