THE DOG SHOW

Champions Landsdowne Sunflower and Pride's Hill Tweak 'Em Premier Winners

Over 200 Entries From All Sections
of the United States and
Canada

It was a great Dog Show and surpassed, to be trite, the most sanguine expectations of its most sanguine promoters.

There were about 200 entries and half of them were technically 'show' dogs. The entry count omits dogs entered for exhibition only, which later category included Police Dog Champion Fels, Police Dog Reserve Grand Champion Bodo von Weissenberg, and a number of other entries equally well known.

The contest for Best in Show narrowed down, on the closing day, to Capt. Quincey Adams Shaw McKean's wire haired fox terrier Champion Pride's Hill Tweak 'Em, and Mrs. B. F. Lewis Jr.'s. equally celebrated greyhound, Champion Landsdowne Sunflower. Tweak 'Em shaded his rival in the matter of record, having been four times adjudged Best in Show at Madison Square and in London—one more premier honor than had been taken by Landsdowne Sunflower, if our records are correct—but the decision of the judges finally went in favor of the Greyhound, with Tweak 'Em adjudged Best in Opposite Sex. It is said that the two winners of the leading honors will shortly meet in compe-

tion again, in London, and it will be interesting to see whether the Pinehurst decision is confirmed or reversed at that time. As matters now stand, the two dogs are now on an absolutely equal footing, so far as bench show record is concerned.

There was an exceptionally large entry for the Pointer class, as large if not larger than the entry at the last Madison Square show. This class brought out Applejack, an upstanding black and white pointer owned by W. W. Lindley, who won straight through from Novice to Winners.

The Willowbrook Kennels' Willowbrook Rock, one of the best English Setters shown in recent years, won against a field that was as high in quality as any that has been exhibited in this country.

The Greyhound Class brought together the famous trio, Landsdowne Star, Landsdowne Sunbeam and Landsdowne Sunflower, and the Shepherds, better known as Police Dogs, had also an exceptionally classy entry, although the judges lost not time in awarding Winners Dogs to the Lewanno's Kennels Artus Mercedes and the Winners Bitches to Meta of Lewanno.

The Airedale Class was a bit one sided or one dogged, Champion Normanton Tipit winning easily.

The class of the show is well illustrated by the fact that entries as well known, as Norwood Johnson's French griffon, Homere's Jack, and Miss Runyon's Yorkie, Peggy, had to content themselves with secondary honors in the Miscellaneous Class.

One thing that went a long way towards achieving the show's big success

was the remarkable array of trophies and prizes offered. According to the exhibitors, the prizes, taking them all together, were the most satisfactory ever offered at any dog show.

GREAT TENNIS

First Annual North and South Tennis Tournament Opens Outdoor Season

A Remarkable Field, Including Some
of the Best Players in the Country
Take Part

Our First Annual United North and South Tennis Tournament has been unanimously hailed and heralded by the press of the country as the official and most auspicious opening of the outdoor tennis season, and the New York Times referred to the entry list, on Monday last, as follows:

"Aside from the recent Florida State championships, in which Molla Bjurstedt once more emphasized her superiority among American women players, the first important outdoor event in the Eastern regions is the newly established North and South tournament which opens at Pinehurst, N. C., today. An impressive entry list has been announced in advance, including the new indoor champion Vincent Richards, with his partner of both the national doubles titles, William T. Tilden, Jr., as well as the Japanese star, Ichiya Kumagae, and the former indoor champion, S. Howard Voshell. For the women's event Miss Marion Zinderstein and Mrs. Marion Vanderhoff Morse, each a recent runner up for a singles title, are sure entries,
