AMERICAN GOLFERS WILL
TAKE THEIR BEST TO
ENGLAND

Having succeeded in winning a British tennis championship, America will make a most serious effort next summer to annex the English golf titles.

Funds have been in the process of solicitation since last fall to send a big team of the best American golfers after the British championship and success of the financial drive seems sure.

Looking toward the amateur title of the Isles, the United States Golf Association has announced plans of similar proportion.

"Chick" Evans, present American champion, S. Davidson Herron, last year's champion; Francis Ouimet, former title holder; Bobby Jones, Nelson Whitney, "Buck" Wittemore, Reginald Lewis and Max Marston have agreed to make the trip across the Atlantic. Robert A. Gardner, who made such a splendid showing in last year's championship also may join the invaders.

Miss Alexa Sterling, Mrs. William A. Gavin and other noted women players are also planning to make the trip over to meet the best of the British women.

England is somewhat aroused over the invasion and some of the leading

authorities through the press are trying to lead the more pessimistic followers away from the belief that the American contingent will be impossible to beat.

British players who toured America last summer took back with them generous tales of the improvement in the American game and they sounded a warning to their countrymen to wake up and devote their attention to the development of youngsters, else America would step in and take away from them their prized dominion of the links.
