## Canadian Apples to England

Every ship leaving the eastern ports of Canada for the British Isles is freighted with from 200 to 10,000 barrels of Canadian apples.

The eastern provinces produced a bumper apple crop. The yield of Ontario, the banner apple province, which includes the rich Niagara fruit belt, was heavier than in 1919. Quebec and New Brunswick also set a higher mark. Nova Scotia's output of 900,000 barrels was the largest ever harvested.

British Columbia, at the opposite side of the continent, has become one of the important fruit growing regions of North America.
