HARMON BROTHERS LEAD STRONG FIELD

(Continued from Page 3) and pass the brothers before the seventytwo holes had been run out.

The Harmons played remarkable golf. They played 72 holes without taking a single six. They registered 57 holes in par, nine in birdies and six in one under par. This was golf worth taking the prize and it did. Their rounds were 69-66-68-70-273.

It was only through superb team work that the Harmons were able to pull through. They appeared to understand one another perfectly, and while other pairs, probably because of lack of proper knowledge of one another's temperament were not pulling together as they should. the brothers kept knocking off the parin a steady stream.

The Harmons led the field at the end of the first day with rounds of 69-66-135. but were closely trailed by Jesse Guilford and Tom Boyd, at 137, and Hagen and Robeson at 138. The critics here thought that with such formidable pairs on their S. O. Miller, Englewood, heels the Harmons would weaken but they never gave any indication whatever of cracking. They came within an ace of making it four rounds under 70, for C. W. Deibel, Youngs-Tommy's bid for a 69 on the final round hit the cup but rolled off.

They Other scores were: went out on the last day confident of catching the Harmons and were more concerned about Hagen, for they knew of Walter's ability to come up from the rear in the finish of a golfing hunt. Chapman and John Golin one round and thus leave an opening, but they did not figure the thing correctly. It must have gotten on the nerves of

Guilford and Boyd, for they were paired S. M. Newton and W. Thompwith the Harmons for the last two rounds and every time they looked up one of the Harmons was getting a par or a birdie. It was the Guilford-Boyd team Jack Davidson and Harry that cracked a little, and at the seventeenth hole of the third round both Guilford and Boyd left themselves short putts for fours and both missed.

Jesse missed his first and did not hole for a five. Then Boyd did the same thing, failing his putt by an inch for a five. He walked off the green but returned when his attention was called to the fact that neither he nor Guilford had holed out. The committee gave them a two stroke penalty which made a seven H. G. Phillips and Irving on a par three hole.
