## Annual St. Valentine's Tournaments

**W**HEN Joseph P. Hotchkiss of the New Haven Country Club rather overwhelmed T. Russell Brown of Malletts Bay, Vermont, in the final of the St. Valentine's tournament, he again added to the cumulative evidence that a medalist does, and frequently too, win a tournament.

More than that, Brown, the runner-up for chief tournament honors, was also runner-up in the qualifying round which made this pair of promising young golfers outstanding in the record entry field. Their respective qualifying scores were 74 and 77.

Neither player was down to the scoring of the testing round in the final, which is not unusual.

Consolation—W. H. Taylor defeated James Barber, 1 up.

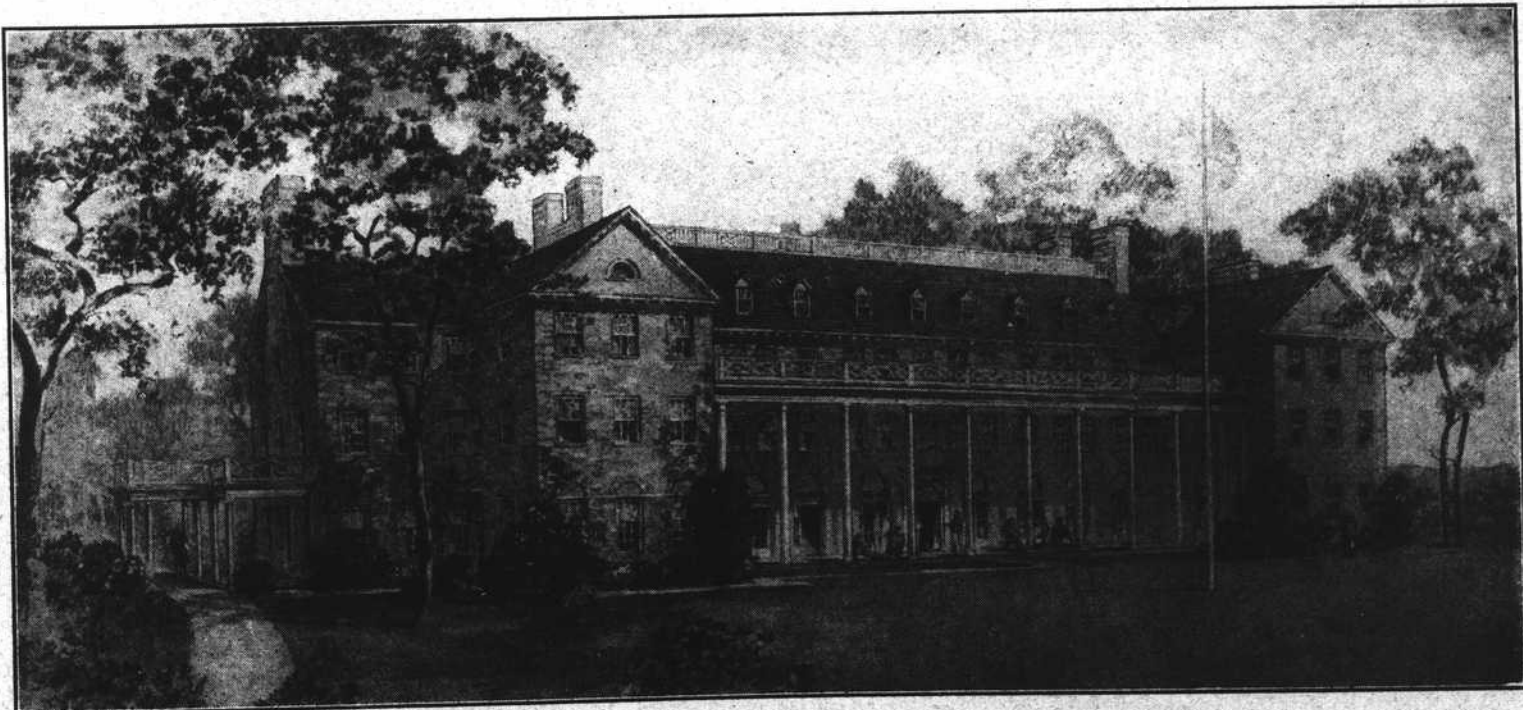
Seventh Flight—J. W. Nye defeated J. S. Weigel, 20 holes.
