
The Gymkhana

The Grantland Rice Sportlight, ready with its sound cameras, was not disappointed. (The pictures will be released about December 16th and will be at the Carolina shortly after.)


Mr. Picquet managed the races and he and Dr. J. B. Giltner judged all the events.




W. V. Slocock, Mrs. Beverley Walters, Beverley Walters (bareback rider) and Mrs. Richard S. Tufts on the way to the races.
