The airplane view above gives some idea of how conveniently everything at Maplewood is arranged. The casino and tea-garden, where the large colony of young people and their elders watch the tennis courts, the last hole of the famous eighteen-hole championship course, and the sparkling cement pool with its white sand beach where golfers, tennis-players, horseback riders, trapshooters, and mountain climbers take a refreshing dip. The main clubhouse has entertained thousands of people accustomed not only to the comforts but to the refinements and gayeties of life.

A new attraction this year will be a Polo Camp under the direction of Lyle Phillips, polo coach at Phillips Andover Academy. Colonel Anderson of the Pennsylvania Military College will be there also.
