FBI LEADER CHARGES CORRUPTION, GRAFT IN MIAMI, FLA. AREA

Hoover Asserts Six Police Officers Have Records, and Some Have Served Time; Criminal Influx a Problem

SMILE AT CONFIDENCE MEN

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6-(AP)-J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation has announced that his staff found "Evidence indicating local graft, corruption, and inefficiency" in the Miami, Fla., area.

This charge and another that police authorities of the resort failed to cooperate with the justice department's investigation, were made before a House appropriation subcommittee in testimony made public today.

Hoover declared the FBI had tried to work with local authorities, but received "little or no actual cooperat.ion."

"Police officers in that area have been instructed," he charged, "Not to come near the representatives of the FBI. They have been told that if they were seen going in or coming out of our offices they would be blacklisted."
